# Prakrit Language in New Education Policy 2020

After about four years in the making, the draft National Education Policy is out in the public domain. It is a matter of great pleasure that Prakrit language has been included in the new education policy. The policy recognises the crucial importance of the study of modern and classical languages like Prakrit, Sanskrit, Pali, Persian. According to the committee of experts, Prakrit & Sanskrit has played a great role in the Indian tradition of the quest for knowledge. It proposes separate institutions for regulation, funding, standard setting and accreditation, a National Research Foundation, and a Rashtriya Shiksha Aayog/ National Education Commission.

## Jain Prakrit Inscription discovered on wall of rock-cut cave at Lohgad fort

PUNE: A Jain inscription dating back to the 2nd or 1st century BC was recently discovered by Shrikant Pradhan, an ancient Indian paintings scholar working at Deccan College Post Graduate and Research Institute. The inscription was found on the outside wall of a rock-cut cave on the eastern side cliff of the Lohgad fort, close to Lohgadwadi village.

Pradhan said, "The inscription is written in the Brahmi script and the language is Prakrit influenced Sanskrit. The inscription is similar to, but more descriptive than, an inscription discovered at Pale caves by archaeologists HD Sankalia and Shobhana Gokhale in 1969. It starts with 'Namah Arihantanam' which is commonly used by Jains, pointing to the fact the Lohgad cave is ...continued on page 7

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



#### Introduction of $\bar{A}c\bar{a}rva-3$

#### Ācārya Siddhasen Diwakar



Ācārya Siddhasen Diwakar (Fifth century A. D.) was a highly intelligent Jain acharya of his time, who wrote works on Jain philosophy and epistemology. Siddhasen Diwakar has been such an able teacher of Jain philosophical who not only did the important work of tying the theoretical and (Agamic) textual inductive definitions and words into the boundaries of philosophy but also gave them a new dimension. In the Jain tradition, he has been called the father of logic and Sanskrit philosophy. He was a proto-Jain philosopher as well as a receptive of proto-Indian philosophies.

Ācārya Siddhasen could study the scriptures and realize their truth in a short time. In due course he became the most well known Jain scholar of the time. He was like the illuminating lamp of the Jain order and therefore came to be known as Siddhasen Diwakar. He is credited with the authorship of many books but most of them unfortunately are not available. Sanmatitarka is his best book on logic and is widely read even at present.

Siddhasena's main contribution in the Sanmatitarka is his analysis of the Jain theory of Anekantavada. According to Jeffery Long, Siddhasena divides two the seven classical

Jain nayas (standpoints, viewpoints) into two categories: "those which affirm the substantiality of existence (dravyāstikanayas) and those which affirm the impermanent, changing aspects of existence (paryāyāstikanayas)." This view sees the best account of reality as one which includes permanence and impermanence, identity and difference in a complex set of contradictory relations. Siddhasena also argued that the number of possible nayas or viewpoints of reality is potentially limitless.[1] He then goes on to correlate each of the nayas with the positions of Indian philosophical schools, showing how each view is only a partial, one sided view.

He inspired the Jain monks to study profoundly the Jain scriptures. He himself devoted to the deep study of Jain works. He was bitterly opposed to the storage of Jain works in isolated places; he eagerly desired to bring them to light for the propagation of Jainism. He himself wrote collected and edited certain important Jain works. He complied the famous "Kalvanmandir Stotra". It is a monumental work in Sanskrit poetry. He wrote well known "Sakal tirth stotra" with the details of all Jain Tirtha of that time. This work itself places Siddhasen Diwakar on a high pedestal of Jain scholars and pioneers of religious Acharya's of the fifth century.

Legendary Scholars of Prakrit & Jainology – 3

#### Prof. Jagdish Chand Jain (1909-1994)



Prof. Dr. Jagdish Chandra Jain (1909-1994), a legendary figure in the field of Indology, specifically Jainological and Prakrit studies, occupied the Chair in the Universities of Bombay (India), Peking (China) and Kiel (Germany). His lecture tour to most of the international universities of Europe, Soviet Union, USA, Canada and Latin America was a milestone of his efforts to bring the Indian wisdom in the practical grip of human society. Besides being an author of more than 80 books on a variety of subjects, he has contributed numerous research papers to Indian and foreign journals.

He did his M.A. in Philosophy from Banaras Hindu University, Shastri in Sanskrit and Ph.D. in Sociology (Ancient Indian History) from Bombay University. He was a research scholar in 1932-33 at Shantiniketan (now Vishwa Bharati University). He has 30 years of teaching experience in the Ram Narian Ruia College (University of Bombay) as a Professor and Head of the Deptt. of Hindi. He has been a

Research Guide in Hindi for Ph. D. students since 1960 and was Professor and Research Guide in 1958-59 in Prakrit and Jainology in Prakrit Jain Institute (Government of Bihar) of postgraduate studies.

One aspect of Dr. Jain's versatile personality was his active participation in the freedom struggle of India and association with Mahatma Gandhi, Gurudeva Tagore and Pt. Jawaharlal Nehru. The Municipal Corporation of Mumbai, honoured him by naming the road of his residence after him and to keep his memory alive, the Government of India has released a commemorative postal stamp recently. He was the recipient of several national and international literary awards. Some of his outstanding works include the Vasudeva Hindi, A Jain Version of the Brhatkatha; Life in Ancient India as Depicted in Jain Canons; Prakrit Sahitya Ka Itihasa; Bhagwan Mahavir (in different languages); Jain Agam Sahitya Men Bharatiya Samaj, Jain Sahitya Ka Brhad Itihas, History and Development of Prakrit Literature, Studies in Early Jainism; Prakrit Narrative Literature, Prakrit Pushkarini etc.

History and Development of Prakrit Literature traces the important role played by Prakrit language and narrative literature in the development of Indian languages and literature. This is considered to be the first attempt ever, by any Indian or foreign scholar in this field.

#### Gyan Vatika Pathshala starts teaching Prākrit Language via ZOOM

New Delhi [India], April 30 (ANI): Gyan Vatika Pathshala, under the banner of Shri Jin Kushal Suri Dadawadi trust has started to teach Prakrit language to the children via zoom classes.

The Prakrits are a historical group of vernacular Middle Indo-Aryan languages used in India from around the 3rd century BCE to the 8th century CE. The trust has started to teach Prakrit to let younger generation acquaint themselves with the language which is facing extinction.

"Prakrit language is one of the important languages of Jainism and India and all the historic scriptures have been written in this language. Today people learn foreign languages but we took the opportunity of lockdown to start teaching our language to the young generation," Rajnish Jain, Director, Pathshala told ANI. "We are teaching this language to the children of age group between 4 and 14," he added. Speaking to ANI in charge of Pathshala Ujjwal Jain said that this language is on the verge of extinction."Prakrit language is on the verge of extinction and we have been taught to encourage people to learn the language so we started to teach this online. First, we had 10 to 12 children but now we have around 100 children who are learning this language online." Ujjwal told ANI. (ANI)

## The World Leaders Greets in Prākrit Language 'Micchā me Dukkaḍaṃ' on Kṣamāpana Parva

It is a matter of happiness and pride that even the top leaders of the world are apologizing for their mistakes by saying "miccha me dukkadam" in India's ancient language Prakrit. "Michhami Dukkadam" is an ancient Prakrit phrase that means "May all my bad deeds turn futile". So concept behind saying or writing someone "Michchhami Dukkadam" is that if I have done any harm to you, then those bad deeds to be forgiven (be fruitless). It is an expression that Jains sat to each other after Paryushan the Jain festival of austerity sacrifice and forgiveness - seeking forgiveness if they have intentionally or unintentionally hurt the other person in any way.

In Jainism, forgiveness is one of the main virtues that needs to be cultivated by the Jains.Kṣamāpanā or supreme forgiveness forms part of one of the ten characteristics of dharma. In the Jain prayer, (pratikramana) Jains repeatedly seek forgiveness from various creatures—even from ekindriyas or single sensed beings like plants and microorganisms that they may have harmed while eating and doing routine activities. Forgiveness is asked by uttering the phrase,

On this sacred day, every member of the Jain community approaches everyone, irrespective of religion, and begs for forgiveness for all their faults or mistakes, committed either knowingly or unknowingly. Thus relieved of the heavy burden hanging over their head of the sins of yesteryears, they start life afresh, living in peaceful co-existence with others. Indeed, this day is not merely a traditional ritual, but a first step on their path to liberation or salvation, the final goal of every man's life, according to the teachings of Jainism. Pratikraman also contains the following prayer:

खमामि सव्व जीवाणं, सव्वे जीवा खमंतु मे । (Khāmami savva-jīvaņam, savvë jiva khamantu me) मित्ति मे सव्व-भूदेसु, वेरं मज्झं ण केणवि ॥ (metti me savva-bhūdesu, veram mejjham ņa keņavi)

Speaking about festivals today, I would first like to wish you all michhamidukkadam. The Jain community celebrated the Samvatsari Parva. In the month of Bhadra, ParyushanParva is celebrated by the Jain Community. The last day of ParyushanParva is observed as Samvatsari. This is indeed a remarkable tradition. The festival of Samvatsari is symbolic of forgiveness, non-violence and brotherhood. It is also known as the KshamavaniParva, and on this day, people traditionally greet each other with, 'michhamidukkadam.' We have been hearing in our shaastras, our holy texts, "KshamaVeerasya Bhushanam", that is, forgiveness is the adornment of the brave. The one who forgives is valiant. And Mahatma Gandhi always said, that forgiveness is the quality of great men.

Shakespeare in his play, "The Merchant of Venice", while explaining the importance of forgiveness, has written, "Mercy is twice blest, It blesseth him that gives and him that takes," meaning, the forgiver and the forgiven both stand to receive divine blessing.

The completion of this Prakrit Lecture Series on the day of Shrut Panchami Prakrit Day, on May 26, 2020, by the discourse of influential disciple of Sant Shiromani Param Pujya Acharyashree Vidyasagar Ji Maharaj, the great Mahakavi of Prakrit-Sanskrit Language & the founder of many scriptures Pujya Munishree Pranamya Sagar Ji. In his address, while referring to the ancient tradition of the Agam Shastras and the importance of the Shrut Wisdom treasure contained in them, he said that due to these reasons, the fame of our country was known as Vishwaguru in ancient times. Therefore, its protection and propagation is the need of today's era. Shrutpanchami festival is also the great cause of the preservation of ancient scriptures. The large literature of the Ancient Mass language Prakrit and Apabhramsa, is the renewable storehouse of knowledge and science. They should be studied extensively. The government should also worry about its protection.

In the same session, Brahmi Script Expert and a Guest Lecturer in the Department Jain Philosophy, Sampurnanand Sanskrit University, Varanasi; Dr. Munni Jain presented the relation of 'Prakrit Language and Ancient Brahmi Script' as a summary and said that 'If the secret of Inscriptions is to be understood then knowledge of Prakrit language and Brahmi script is mandatory'.

....a Jain rock-cut cave. The inscription at Pale caves also began in a similar manner and based on Sankalia and Gokhale's study, it was assumed to be a Jain inscription."

The inscription mentions a name 'Ida Rakhita', meaning Indra Rakshita, who donated water cisterns, rock-cut benches to settlements in the area. "The inscription at Pale also mentions the same name. The new discovered inscription is 50cm-wide and 40cm-long and is written in six lines. The palaeography of both are similar, pointing to them being engraved in the same period," Pradhan said.

Shrikant Ganvir, the assistant professor at the department of ancient history and culture at Deccan College, said, "The discovery of this inscription gives us insight into Jain culture and spread of Jainism. The Pale caves' inscription was standalone and too limited to speak about the spread of Jainism.
